There're so many careers that exist and many of those may not exist by the time your child is close to entering the working world as well as those careers we don't even realise will be an option yet.

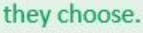




It's going to be a really good idea to encourage your child to start to take responsibility for their own decision making as after all, it is their future we're talking about.

Just in the same way that they may get involved with choosing a new pair of trainers or the latest games console, they should be actively participating in the process and where possible gathering information to help feed into their own informed decision making. This will result in them being more motivated and driven to take on the

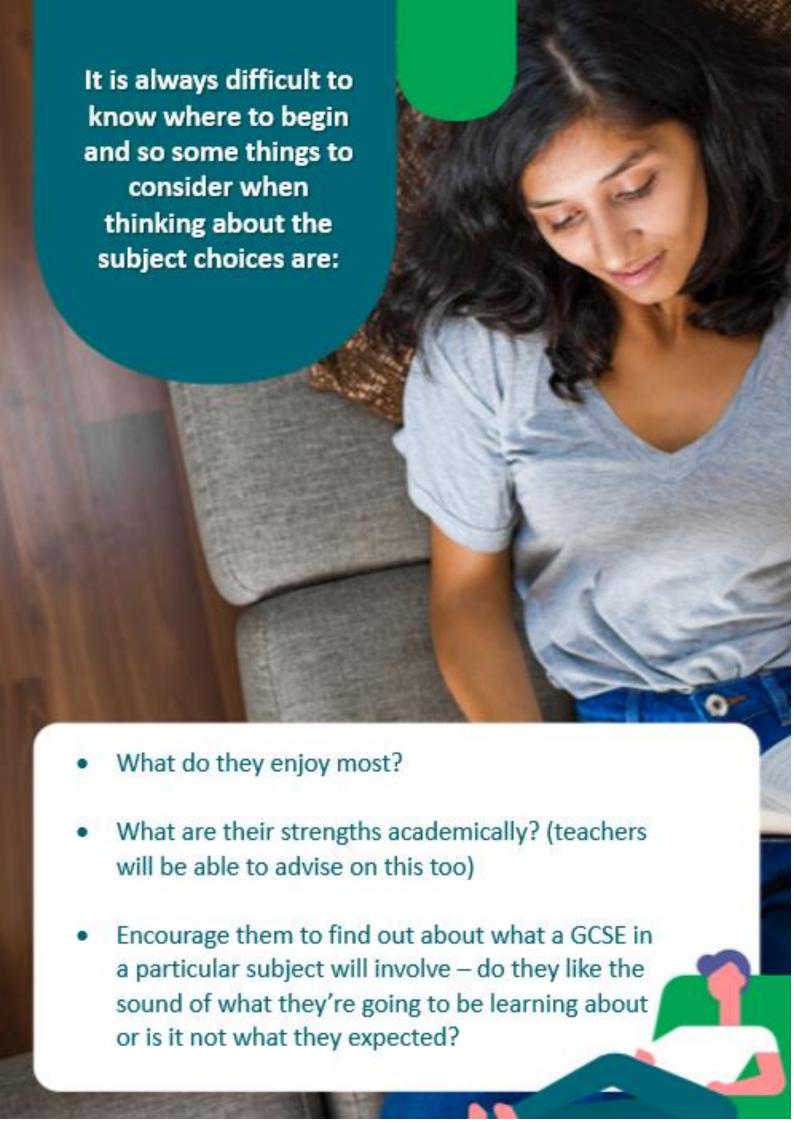
demands of the pathway











Careers Research is the part where you and your child can start to consider the longer term if you feel that this is going to be helpful at the stage. Once they get into the practise of doing their own careers research they will be able to apply this approach throughout their learning and working life!



This part will be very individual to each young person and where they are in thinking process, they could be at the very start and have not ever considered their future and this is absolutely fine. There's always going to be a temptation to compare themselves to their peers and they will always have friends who say they have a clear plan – good for them, your child will gradually move forward with their thinking, the more they find out!





## CAREERS RESEARCH CAN INVOLVE:

- Speaking to the Careers Adviser who works at their school. There
  may be opportunity for them to make an appointment or even
  give them a note with a question on giving the Careers Adviser
  time to come back to them.
- Start to access online resources of which there are many and it all depends on where they are at with their thinking. For example, simply googling 'what careers are linked to history' will bring up websites for them to explore.
- Using careers questionnaires online which match your personal characteristics to potential job roles. These are a great way to get the ball rolling in terms of making links between your likes, dislikes, strengths and weaknesses and future career ideas. Once they have completed the questions, they can go on to find out more about those different careers that take their interest

#### THINK AHEAD!

Looking at Higher Education provider websites. Yes, you read that right, even whilst in Key Stage 3!

This may sound like a silly idea as there are many years of learning still in front of them, but it shouldn't stop you and your child from checking them out.

For example, your child may be showing a particular interest in English as a subject but doesn't know what this could mean when thinking about the future. Looking at the details of a degree course in English can start to open their understanding of the prospect of studying at university when they're older.

This should be kept light touch where possible and not get too tied up in the fine details of all it entails. Looking at tabs such as 'entry requirements' or 'careers' should be most beneficial.





Overall, when it comes to GCSE options it's really important that they are clear on their expectations of the subjects they've chosen to take as so to avoid any unwanted surprises during key stage 4.

Their school will provide lots of really useful information leading up the decision deadline so it's really important that you encourage them to engage with this and what is even more important is that they are encouraged to ask questions!
